Short Narrative Description of Research, Teaching and Service Interests

My research largely focuses on understanding determinants of human capital¹ as well as its importance to economic well-being in the context of economic development and poverty, with an emphasis on child poverty. In other words, in my research I hope to better understand the circumstances that allow individuals to develop the skills and characteristics necessary to flourish in resource poor settings. To this end, my research includes work examining the long-term effects of shocks during key transitional periods in human development—namely, early childhood and adolescence. My work also explores the relationship between climate variation and natural disasters and child and adolescent long-term well-being as well as how the influence of this relationship can cross generations.

My work has been presented and well received at professional meetings and conferences around the world. I have published in well-respected journals in development economics including *American Journal of Agricultural Economics* and the *Journal of African Economies*. I also make explicit efforts to disseminate my research to policymakers and other stakeholders by participating in events and conferences designed to foster conversation and collaboration between academics and practitioners such as the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Early Childhood Symposium as well as the International Conference on Food Assistance.

My teaching program focuses on microeconomic theory with an emphasis on empirical application and international development. Since joining the department in August 2014, I have had five course preps including three undergraduate and two PhD courses. At the PhD level I have taught Sustainable Development, which I developed and taught for the first time here at UNM, and Econometric Theory I, a course which all first year PhD students are required to take. At the undergraduate level, I have enjoyed teaching Introductory Microeconomics, Intermediate Microeconomics and Development Economics. In each of my classes, I aim to communicate to my students the broad scope of economic applications and to equip them with the quantitative tools of this discipline to pursue those applications with empirical rigor.

I also have a record of service to my profession, department and community. I have served as a peer reviewer for numerous well-respected journals. I have also acted as a discussant at numerous conferences and professional meetings. Within my department I have served on five committees: the seminar committee in which I help to bring and host speakers to the department; the econometrics committee, in which we organize the sequence of required PhD econometric courses as well as create and grade the econometrics core exam; the undergraduate committee; the graduate committee, an ad-hoc committee for a 3-2 degree program in the department of economics, in which we discussed the feasibility of offering such a program in the Department of Economics, and the graduate committee. In the graduate committee, we overhauled the Department's first-year PhD student with the aim of enhancing our graduate student's long-term success. Finally, I serve the community of Albuquerque through participating in an annual "Serve the City" event in which churches throughout the city partner to clean schools, serve homeless shelters, work at food banks, and numerous other service activities. I also do volunteer work for the Children, Youth, and Families Department.

¹ Human capital is comprised of the skills, knowledge and experience possessed by an individual that have economic value. It includes numerous individual traits such as health, education, cognitive ability, socio-emotional status, among others.
